## Our Strategic Intents

#### Mission

Creating environments for life change with children who have experienced trauma.

#### Vision

Our programs provide children with a greater opportunity to become adults who flourish, unencumbered by their past.

#### Fundamentals of our approach

Our programs deliver hope to children who have experienced trauma.

We aim to create enduring pathways of connection for the children who participate in our programs. Our intended pathway is for children to first join us for our primary age program at 7-11 years and graduate to SCKC Wild as 12-14 year olds. Where appropriate, graduates of our programs may progress to volunteer as apprentice leaders aged 15-17 years. At 18 years of age they can become fully-fledged adult team members.

Our primary method of engaging with our target audience is via a five-day overnight camping program. Our camps are characterised by a 1:1 camper:buddy ratio. We have additional support staff to deliver the program.

We provide an environment in which children, volunteers and staff are physically, psychologically and culturally safe

SCKC is a Christian faith-based not-for-profit charity. We are motivated to serve our campers and community by the hope we have in Jesus Christ. We respect people regardless of their faith background. Our programs are open to children of any, or no faith background.

#### Our strategic intents

#### 1. Our key intention is that children will experience a safe environment

At Camp, the safety of every child is paramount. We have excellent policies in place, which are alive and evident in practice.

This experience will be created by a team of safe adults whose priority is the children in their care. They will focus on the delivery of happy memories for every child.

We will deliver exciting, engaging and wellorganised programs. These will build resilience, hope, self-esteem, relationship skills and a positive view for the future.

We have a current Reconciliation Action Plan to guide our engagement with Indigenous Australians and provide for cultural safety among Indigenous participants in our programs.



#### 2. Team development lies at the centre of all we deliver

Our teams are outstanding. They are committed to our fundamentals and embody qualities that have endured from our foundation, such as sacrifice, persistence, inclusion and calmness.

Team members possess these attributes:

- **Faith:** while everyone is on a journey in regards their faith, our key leaders (camp directors, buddies, core staff) are people of faith who acknowledge Jesus Christ as their Saviour.
- Integrity: their lives within and outside the context of camp are guided by strong moral principles. Our volunteers and staff, while not perfect, try to live consistently with their faith and values.
- **Character:** they possess the personal attributes that make them good role models for children and adults. Our teams comprise unique individuals, with differing strengths and personal qualities. When their character is developed, they provide great examples for all.
- **Competency:** they are trained, prepared and understand the role they play on camp and in our organisation. We are team players and do everything in the best interests of the children in our care. We are always ready to learn and improve.

We develop people who can effectively deliver our programs. Regardless of where they serve in our organisation, if they are in our realm, we intend to improve their skills and character. We want each person to succeed.

We select Camp Directors carefully. We train and equip them for the successful delivery of our programs to each child and volunteer. Teams will be effective through engaged and passionate leadership. We support Directors through regular communication, honest feedback and by providing fresh resources to help them prepare their teams and deliver great camps.

Our annual leadership summit provides specialist input, opportunities to share experiences and learn from each other. Through the active participation of all camp directors, core team and staff we



Annual Report 2023 intend to continue to shape SCKC to proactively grow in its delivery of service to every child. We intend to encourage each other in a stimulating, rewarding and enjoyable environment.



## 3. SCKC will grow in effectiveness through the development of a broad support base

Our main initiatives are:

Develop resourcing relationships: we provide opportunities for individuals, groups and companies to partner with us. We are selective in who we partner with. We require an alignment of values. This partnership is not simply about finance. While finance is vital, we seek ways to invite our partners to join us in various ways, on camp itself or in the activities that enable camps to occur.

We also seek to serve and promote our partners and return benefit to those supporters. We value generosity and will exercise this with our time, words and acknowledgment of those who support us.

- *Fundraising:* we conduct significant fundraising events. These endeavours provide the capacity to fund our initiatives. Priority for the proceeds of these events resides with our camps and the effective training of our volunteers.
- *Grants:* we seek and hope to win larger, longer-term grants and maintain excellent relationships with donors.
- Social media: We use social media to promote our organisation and its activities and supply content which assists others. We use social media for major fundraising initiatives and to increase our support base.

• *Innovative income streams:* we pursue alternate opportunities that provide fresh income streams for our organisation. We continually seek new relationships.

#### 4. Organisational excellence

The national SCKC organisation will:

- Provide excellent service to our teams: the Board and National Office will respond in a timely manner, focused on solutions and engage all we encounter with an outstanding proactive attitude. We exist to serve.
- Develop healthy support structures: our policies and procedures reflect best practice nationally and are implemented across the entire organisation. We embrace technology and through our on-line presence serve our growing and geographically dispersed network with useful resources and information.
- Our Board, committees and specialist leadership groups: will adopt a visionary and innovative posture, utilising the necessary expertise to exercise their duties to advance the organisation.
- Recruit, across generations, the best available people into leadership: we renew people in leadership to ensure the organisation is continually refreshed. Succession planning is valued and practiced. Diversity in leadership and all areas is sought and appreciated.

## 5. SCKC will enhance its effectiveness through the creation of community and partner alliances

Our key alliances in this area reside predominately with the individual camps in their region:

- *Referring agencies:* we align with the nation's best. Our reputation is built on our care for the children that are referred to us and the quality of our programs and people.
- *Church communities:* we will consolidate relationships with sponsoring churches, extend partnerships with churches to plant new camps. We help faith communities recognise the value of SCKC.
- *Campsite providers:* we partner with camp sites who share our vision and understand our campers. We involve ourselves nationally with the camping governing bodies.

#### 6. The future

- *Camps:* we aspire long-term to have a presence in every region of Australia. We intend to launch 1-2 new camps each year. Long term sustainability is a key underlying consideration.
- Our own camp site: we look to operate our own camping facility to host Southern Cross Kids' Camps and support our organisation financially.
- Indigenous Australians: SCKC will develop opportunities to serve Indigenous Australians. We will seek out relationships and insights to maximise our contribution and effectiveness. We will maintain and implement a Reconciliation Action Plan.
- A pathway of connection: We will develop a pathway for campers to engage with SCKC from primary school age to adulthood. We run primary-aged camps and Wild junior youth camp for graduated camper. We provide opportunities for children to serve as apprentice leaders or cousins to serve on our regular primary-aged camps and then to serve on camp as a fully accredited adult leaders.





### About us

Southern Cross Kids Camps is a Christian organisation that interrupts the cycle of abuse and neglect in primary aged children who have had an unfair start in life.

Our camps are designed to bring fun, undivided attention and acceptance to the children who have been entrusted to us. We want to give them the best week of their year.

Every child on camp is assigned a "Buddy" who cares for them over the course of the week. This 1:1 ratio brings about incredible results for the child.



2023 has been another outstanding year for SCKC, with 17 Camps across five states & territories. An incredible 650 volunteers serving 400 kids. Including a new camp launched from the Gold Coast, which was a great success.

2023 saw a number of former campers return as leaders, this is always a highlight.

SCKC continues to go from strength the strength, with an exciting future in store.









## Chair's Report

I was listening to a podcast recently and the speaker talked about our lives being "lived in a river". He said that if that's the case and we're just treading water, then we will be carried to wherever the currents take us. Rather, he said, we need to "swim with intent" to get to where we want to go; conceivably that could be with, across or against the current.

SCKC's National Board are committed to doing much more than treading water. Our strategic intents document defines our purpose and approach as an organisation and helps us navigate the many and varied currents we encounter. Time and again it has proved to be an invaluable guide as to what is both good and right for us as an organisation.

One area where the Board in 2023 has "swum with intent" has been in relation to our core responsibility for the governance of SCKC. There were several highlights in this respect:

- Membership renewal: there were several changes in Board membership through 2023, with two new Board "visitors" (Paulina Smith, Sarah Melville), Will Goh moving from "visitor" to full member and Wilma Calvert retiring from the Board. We will continue to look to identify and attract talented people to our Board, who are able to provide both stability and opportunity for long-term renewal.
- CMA Conference and annual Board planning day: as a Board, we spent two days together participating in the annual Christian Ministry

Advancement (CMA) conference. This was a great opportunity to gather with like-minded leaders with a passion for strong and healthy governance in faith-based organisations. We heard about leading practices in many areas of organisational governance and management. We also spent the day after the conference processing the key takeaways and thinking of how we can bring what we learnt into the way SCKC operates. Our plan is to continue to participate in these outstanding conferences and continually improve our effectiveness as a Board.

 Board internship: Sarah Melville, one of our many outstanding emerging leaders and a new Board "visitor", was selected to join CMA's Board Internship program. Sarah is part of a cohort of young leaders from across Australia who are participating in a one-year program in which they are trained in governance for faith-based and not-for-profit organisations and build networks across the sector and nation. It is a unique opportunity for Sarah and SCKC and one that I'm sure our organisation will benefit from

In additional to volunteering on the SCKC National Board, I also get to support my wife, Glenda, in directing the Bendigo SCKC camp. Our 2022 camp was tricky; with largely new cohorts of both campers and buddies and multiple disruptions due to illness among the children and volunteers. Our 2023 camp was much more settled. Most of the 2022 campers returned and quickly fell into the patterns of camp life and extended their trust to us. The team was wonderfully cohesive and highly competent. We had our first group of "cousins", who added significantly to our camp family. As they do, the kids had the best week of their year and looked forward to the prospect of a Bendigo Wild (junior youth) camp in 2025.

I mentioned in passing before that Wilma Calvert retired from the SCKC Board at the end of 2023. Wilma was a great friend of our founder Carolyn Boyd, has been an outstanding and visionary SCKC leader and an effective communicator of the SCKC DNA. While no longer serving on the Board, Wilma will continue to support our regional camps and camp directors. Wilma is one of the heroes of SCKC. Her contribution to our organisation has been immense and deeply appreciated.

2023 was an exceptional year for Southern Cross Kids' Camps.

Across 5 States and Territories, we held 17 camps, delivering the best week of the year to 400 children. The success of these camps wouldn't have been possible without the dedicated efforts of over 650 volunteers who generously contributed their time and skills.

Reflecting on each camp visit, I am consistently reminded of the profound impact of camp and the outstanding individuals who volunteer at SCKC. To everyone involved, both upfront and behind the scenes, thank you for the invaluable role you play in making a positive difference to kids that have had an unfair start to life.

At the annual Leadership Summit in Brisbane, 41 key leaders came together for a weekend of connection, collaboration, and professional development, demonstrating their commitment to excellence. A significant focus of the leadership summit was our Reconciliation Action Plan, now in the final stages of endorsement. Our leaders collaborated on creative ways to meaningfully celebrate Indigenous culture and promote reconciliation during camps and beyond. We look forward to launching our RAP officially in 2024.

Director Training, which occurred alongside the South Sydney camp in April, provided an incredible week of training for our emerging camp leaders. The talent, passion and vision of this group are crucial to the continuation and growth of SCKC camps across the country.

In June, our new Gold Coast camp successfully ran for the first time, bringing hope and joy to the invited kids. We look forward to the continued growth of this camp, meeting the needs of children in this region.

In January we had our 3rd Wild Camp, which is a youth extension camp of the Yarra Ranges camp, where graduated campers can return to SCKC for an outdoor wilderness adventure camp. This camp runs for teens in years 7-9 and this year saw our first cohort of 8 campers graduate. My personal highlight of the year was that 2 of these amazing young people went on to serve on the team of Yarra Ranges Camp, my home-base camp, in July. It was incredible to witness them go full circle in SCKC, having been part of camp for more than half of their lives now! Their commitment to deliver hope to the upcoming generation was inspiring and makes me very excited for the future.

Being part of this incredible organisation is an honour and I look forward to the opportunities that the year ahead holds for SCKC.

SCKC brings together outstanding teams of volunteers to serve their local communities.

Each child who attends camp has one adult leader – "Buddy", who is responsible to give the child the "best week of their year".

The outcomes of camp reach way beyond the week of camp. Improvements I every aspect of life are often reported back to us by Case Workers and family members.

There is no charge for children to attend camp or leaders to serve on camp, therefore fundraising is a major component of SCKC.



#### **Fundraising & Events:**

Conducting a camp is a huge undertaking. As part of that process Camp Directors are responsible for raising of finances to help fund their camp. Sausages are cooked, trivia nights are conducted, gala balls are held, all manner of creative ideas come to the fore locally.

As well as that, Nationally we conduct some significant events.

Our 2023 Cycle4Change bike ride was conducted on the Sunshine Coast in May. This was a huge success, with 30 riders and 12 crew enjoying the challenging course over 4 days of riding. This event continues to grow annually.
